Costa, who is sponsored by the Worcester branch of Sainsbury's, is a Labrador/golden retriever cross, the ideal mix apparently as Labradors are intelligent and golden retrievers want to please. Costa has been with Alan and Sally since he was three months old, this being the first time they have been Puppy Walkers. Costa will remain with them for 12 months becoming familiar with living in a household, going out into the community and learning to be socially well behaved. He will then go to Guide Dog Training School, in Learnington Spa, and eventually be matched to a blind or visually impaired person whose life will be changed forever.

# FOYLE'S WAR AT WATSON STREET

Part of Watson Street Works was turned into a film set for a weekend in February – complete with fake snow, World War II trucks and suspicious-looking cargo!

The area behind the plant's waste heat boiler and in front of the loco sheds became part of Foyle's War, a British detective drama television series set during and shortly after World War II.

The TV crew's aim was to recreate views of a Concentration Camp and disused chemical plant.

"The crew worked all day on the Saturday (in the pouring rain) building a guard tower and gates for the concentration camp as well as laying down the false snow late on the Saturday evening," explained EHS Manager Paul Williams.

"The next morning around 60 crew members

turned up at the site to carry out their part. Galvanised roller shutter doors were covered in camouflage sheeting. Russian signage replaced our normal signs, green screens were erected and the filming took place, without any hitches. By six o'clock on the Sunday evening the site was back to normal except for remnants of false snow around the waste heat boiler."

As part of three two-hour episodes filmed in and around Watson Street and the Liverpool area, the weekend transformation will account for just 1.5 minutes of footage.

# **Senior railcard**

A senior rail card costs just £30 per year (or £70 for three years) and will save travellers aged 60+ a third on fares. To qualify you must have a valid passport or UK driving licence.

You can use your Senior Railcard for long and short trips at almost any time during the week and at weekends. The only restriction is for travel during the morning peak period, Monday to Friday (not including Public Holidays). The times of morning off-peak services do vary by route, so it's best to check with ticket office staff before buying your tickets.

The railcard can be brought online (www.seniorrailcard.co.uk) or over the telephone (0844 871 4036 -7am - 10pm every day, except Christmas Day. Calls are charged at the national rate).

Alternatively, you can purchase your railcard from a staffed station ticket office and some National Rail-licensed Travel Agents.

# ExtraCare at hand

ExtraCare is a service for water customers who need support or reassurance when it comes to everyday tasks from reading a bill to answering the door to officials. The scheme could help your life flow that bit more smoothly.

Call United Utilities on 0845 746 1100 and they'll get you registered right away. They provide large print, Braille and 'talking' water bills. A password scheme to give you peace of mind if one of their team needs to call at your home and extra help during water shut-offs or bursts.

If you have difficulty reading your water bill they can provide the bill in Braille or large print, talk you through your bill over the phone, and even send it to a relative, friend or guardian instead - with your permission of course. If you have hearing or speech difficulties and use a textphone, dial 18001 followed by 0845 746 1100.

If you have a water meter in your home, and you find it difficult to get to it

or read it, they may be able to help by moving it to a more accessible place, as long as your plumbing arrangements allow. If you are blind or partially sighted, it could be arranged for the meter to be read on a quarterly basis. If ever a visit is necessary by United Utilities to your home, they have a special password scheme for customers who want extra reassurance. Let them know the password you would like them to use. When an employee or contractor visitsyour home, ask them for the password before you let them in.

All employees carry identification cards with their photos on. It has a contact number in Braille on the back. They'll know your password if you have registered for the scheme. If still in doubt you can ring them on 0845 746 2200.

If you're struggling to pay your bill, get in touch on 0845 746 2222 if you have a water meter or 0845 746 1100 if you don't.

## TIAs are not just "funny turns"



Those who ignore symptoms of a TIA (transient ischaemic attack) or mini-stroke, are running the risk of having a major stroke, the Stroke Association warns.

Is your water metre easily accessible

TIA causes similar symptoms to a stroke, such as speech problems, but may last only a few minutes. A survey of TIA patients found more than one in three had dismissed their symptoms as just a 'funny turn'.

About 10,000 strokes could be prevented if TIAs were treated, said the charity.

# GP changes to help the elderly

Doctors will receive £50 million of funding so they can see patients seven days a week, under proposed plans launched on 14 April 2014.

GPs would be able to spend longer with frail, elderly patients and people older than 75 will be allocated a GP who will take charge of their treatment. More elderly patients will also be treated at home and be able to see their family doctors in the evenings and at weekends and email them for advice under plans for a radical expansion of surgery opening hours.

GPs in areas across England will receive £50 million of Government funding to reorganise their services so that surgeries will be open from 8am to 8pm, seven days a week. The reforms are expected to see patient consultations over video-link, secure email and telephone. Online booking services will be developed.

Ministers believe that the proposals will end the 'nightmare' that millions of workers face trying to book an appointment with a doctor.



# **MD'S VISIT TO CANADA**





# The visit to Canada as ever was enjoyable.

The starting point was Montreal, which happened to coincide with the Formula One race being in town. This led to hotels being hard to come by and being very crowded. Montreal is in the province of Quebec and the most spoken language is French. Beneficiaries made an effort to speak to me in English, equally I made an



effort to speak to them in French, which was much appreciated by both parties. The business in Montreal historically was part owned and resold many times, therefore the people I met with had worked for several different companies. The consensus around the table was that Pilkington was by far the best employer they had worked for. We spent an enjoyable few hours together discussing the past and the present and then the future, with people already asking when I would next visit.

From Montreal we made the short flight to Toronto in the province of Ontario. Toronto was home to the Scarborough glass plant, which opened in 1951 producing sheet glass and then later float glass. Ultimately the business was sold and after changing ownership several times the site was demolished and now is a housing estate, for posterity one of the roads is named Pilkington Drive.

The gathering was attended by 150 exemployees and their spouses, some of them expatriates from the UK who transferred to Canada and never returned to the UK. The accents were from Liverpool, St Helens, Yorkshire and Scotland so I felt very much at home. Equally a lot of European people worked for the company from Greece, Portugal and Italy and of course local Canadians. There was, therefore, a very cosmopolitan flavour in the room. The feedback from everyone was how much they had enjoyed the opportunity to meet with old friends and share the memories of years working together. Some had interesting stories of events at the plant, Sir Harry Pilkington visiting, the float lines opening and sadly the eventual closure. Once again I came away with the distinct impression that the days spent with "Pilks" were the happiest days.

We then moved on to Winnipeg where Pilkington had interests as early as 1906.

There is still a small business operating in Winnipeg but under different ownership.

The group I met had a vast amount of service with the company and many had dealings with colleagues at Scarborough and Montreal and therefore the loop was completed with questions about who had attended the previous lunches. We spent a very pleasant evening with our guests and I then prepared for the journey home starting the next morning.

On previous visits I have met with people in Vancouver and some years ago Calgary, unfortunately numbers have dwindled to such a point where it is no longer feasible for me to travel that far west to meet people. We still keep in touch with these people via Christine Clinton our co-ordinator in Canada. I thank Christine and her group of volunteers who maintain contact across this vast country to alert us when support is required thus fulfilling our mission statement "There to Care When Care is Needed". ## Keith Atherton recalls his first encounter with Windle

Arriving at Grove Street lodge just before the eight o'clock buzzer blew on day one of 40 plus years at Pilkington, I was taken along the winding passage between the Blacksmiths and electrical shops to the fitting shop at the side of the Canal Street entrance to the works, to begin my working life first as an Apprentice Fitter.

Here I was handed over to Arthur Wright, foreman Fitter. He made out a clock card for me, putting it in the rack next to the clocking on and off clock and showed me how to clock on, telling me that being a minute late clocking on would cost me by being 'quartered': having a quarter of an hour taken from my pay.

He then led me out of the shop, across the yard, past, what I later learned were, the Clay Sheds and Masons' Shop, along the side of Rolled Plate, under the arch of the St Helens to Liverpool railway line, past the discharging bays of Rolled Plate mixing room into the dim, sooty Loco Shed at the far end of the yard next to the Company's and British Rail's Marshalling Yard. Here, he left me under the wing of Bob Fowles, the loco fitter, with whom I was to spend the first few weeks of my working life.

It was also here that I came across 'Windle' and the rest of Internal Transport Department's small fleet of shunting engines that were all steamers: diesels were not introduced until later. Some of the engines at that time were, like Windle, built by 'Borrows' a local company. The others were 'Hunslet' saddle tank engines. I well recall on one occasion, one of the Borrows, having had a major refit, Bob giving me the pleasure, under his eagle eye, of driving her from the back of the shed, out into the daylight, when she was handed back into the hands of one of the loco drivers.

When I first arrived to work with Bob, his Fitter's mate, Fred Swift, from Crawford village, was off work sick. During that major refit, he had been helping Bob to drive a three inch or so pin out of one of the wheels. The wheels and axle were upended: Bob was holding a large drift with a long handle, onto the pin, while Fred was clouting it with his sledge hammer. After a few clouts, Fred lifted his hammer and brought it down. Unfortunately, this time his aim was out. He hit the upper wheel and then his ankle! After getting up off the floor, Fred duly walked, with his ankle numb from the blow, to the Works Surgery, where he was put in plaster and sent home in the company ambulance to recover.

That lot, is of course, a slight distraction. During the 16 years I spent at Sheet Works, including working at the Sandwash, when I was in the Drawing Office, I have no recollection of 'Windle' being at the Sandwash. I cannot see her being used at Washway Lane. She would have been pensioned off by then, I'm sure.

I imagine that her name was derived from either Windle, the family name, or from Windle, one of the parishes of the town. Of course I cannot be positive about that, but, to me, it seems to be the most likely explanation.
