Good luck Peter

Peter Grunwell has retired as a Director of the Trustees of the Pilkington Family Trust after a long association with the Trust beginning in 1998.

Peter has always ensured that the work of the Trust is directed to help those in need. His wise counsel and support during his 21-year tenure has been invaluable.

Peter started working for Pilkington in June 1961 as a member of the Group Accounting Department from where he went to Pontypool in South Wales in 1964 to install the new information management system (IFM) formed in 1962. Returning to St Helens' Head Office in 1965, he was appointed deputy manager of the IFM department and before long was travelling internationally to help implement IFM around the world.

Peter worked for Sir Harry Pilkington's team when the Company went public. Peter had a five-year spell at Cowley Hill works. Eventually he was appointed as an Accountant and was appointed to the main Pilkington Board in 1985, around the beginning of the attempted take over bid by B.T.R.

In his role as Finance Director he travelled world-wide becoming a Director of various overseas boards. In 1993 he went to Toledo, America, as President of Libby Owens Ford before retiring in 1997 and joining as a Trustee of the Pilkington Family Trust not long after.

The Trust wishes him well in his "second" retirement.

David's family summer holiday in 1938 on a farm in North Wales, Pant Glas Isa (near Ruthin) saw a strong bond developing with Mrs Davies, the farm owner and her family, two sons and a daughter. So much so, that an agreement was made; should war be declared David and his brother would go to them as private evacuees rather than being sent to strangers.

When war broke out David, 4½ and George, 7, along with their mother and father drove to the farm without warning – telephones weren't common then! Despite this, a typical warm Welsh hospitality awaited them. Only David's father returned to Liverpool continuing to work at Liverpool docks; dockers, like farmers, were exempt from the forces.

David had left a house in Liverpool built in the 1930s with running water, electric lighting, gas fire and a flush toilet. The farm had no running water, (it had to be brought from a well 150 yards away!); lighting was by paraffin lamp and candles; sanitation was chamber pots under the bed! However, the two families quickly amalgamated into one and the boys soon got immersed into farm life.

Over the years they learned many things including how to feed orphaned lambs, cut corn with a scythe, catch rabbits and tickle trout!

At the end of the war the family

remained in Wales so as not to interrupt the boys' schooling. Their father used to join the family on a regular basis.

Thirteen happy years were spent in Wales. For the last four of those years, David's mum took charge of the housekeeping and the farm accounts after Mrs Davies sadly passed away.

The whole experience of being evacuated changed David's life. It taught him skills and a way of living with nature that he would never have learnt remaining in Liverpool. He became part of a new family.

David is still in contact with his Welsh family and recently organised a get together in Wales, 80 years to the day they were evacuated on 3rd September 2019. David and George and their wives attended with relatives of his original Welsh family.

The farm is still owned by the granddaughter of the original owner, Mrs Davies.

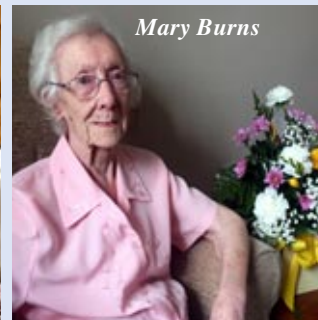

Kings Norton Site Visit - Update

In the last issue of *PRISM*, following a request from retirees, we invited readers to ring in and register their interest in visiting the Kings Norton works before its closure in June 2020. We now have more news about the visit.

After discussion with Kings Norton staff we have been informed that the site visits are open only to ex-employees (no spouse/partners or people who did not work at the site).

In order to verify that someone worked at the Kings Norton site, we have been asked to pass on

names and addresses to the Human Resources Dept to enable them to carry out checks.

If you do not want your name and address to be passed on, you must notify the Trust Funds by Friday 7th February 2020.

The site visits will take place at the end of April or

early May 2020. There will be approximately five separate visits and we will have to allocate names to each of those dates when we receive them.

Once dates are allocated they cannot be changed as there is a maximum number who can visit at one time.

Please note that the Trust

Fund is not involved in the site visits but simply passing on names of those interested. Transport will not be provided to the site.

Charlton family's 135 year service

The gentlemen pictured left are two members of the Charlton family who recently celebrated a momentous occasion - achieving three generations, spanning 135 years of continuous employment within Cowley Hill, Architectural and Automotive.

When the "baby" of the dynasty retired at the end of December, Architectural Strategic Program Director Gary had completed 41 years of service bringing the Charlton family's Pilkington career to a close.

First up in 1916, was Gary's grandfather, George, who joined the company during WWI at the tender age of 13 as an office boy at Cowley Hill.

During WWII, he was in the Home Guard in St Helens protecting the Cowley Hill site from damage caused by stray bombs, during the Blitz on Liverpool. He was also responsible for order execution when all the glass was cut manually and was at Cowley Hill during the early days of Float Glass. George completed his career in 1968 after 52 years' service.

In 1952, George's son Trevor started as a Mechanical Engineering apprentice at Cowley Hill, moving on to work at

Pilkington Ravenhead, manufacturing television tubes. This was followed by Triplex Automotive and finally, Pilkington Fibreglass Insulation, where he completed his long career as the Divisional Chief Engineer. Trevor retired in 1994 after 42 years of service, leaving his son Gary to carry on with the tradition.

Gary also started his career with Pilkington as a Mechanical Engineering apprentice in 1978 at Lakeside Training in St Helens. During his career he held senior positions in both Architectural and Automotive divisions both in Europe & North America.

"As a family we are very proud of our careers within Pilkington," said Gary. "It is the people that you work with over the years that make it such a great organisation, and long may that continue."

MONDAY the boiler was fired to heat the water taken from the nearby stream, the week's clothes were boiled, scrubbed, rinsed and mangled till the whites did gleam.

TUESDAY the flat irons were heated in front of the fire all standing in a row, the shirt collars starched and all the clothes smoothed and ironed, to the ladies last bow.

WEDNESDAY to town she went with friends for lunch for a small fee, then the long haul up the lane with two heavy baskets to make our tea.

THURSDAY the cream was prepared before churning carefully and without haste, the butter then moulded into golden delicious pats after adding salt to taste.

FRIDAY the brick oven was fired to a high temperature to bake the bread, the dough was kneaded and cut into seven loaves to ensure we would be well fed.

SATURDAY the steel fire irons and fenders were polished bright, the kettle given a coat of black lead, the floors scrubbed, the clocks wound and the lamp wicks trimmed to give us light before bed.

SUNDAY the roast and veg were cooked before a quick change into her Sunday best, then the long trek through woods and fields to Chapel, to worship, sit and rest.

After the walk back home in the moonlight and cool night air, to a supper of 'lash up' and at long last a sit in her favourite arm chair.

Thank you Nain for finding the time to love, cherish and please, two little Liverpool boy evacuees.

A former St Helens RLFC player, John is affectionately known to everyone as "Todder" and signed for

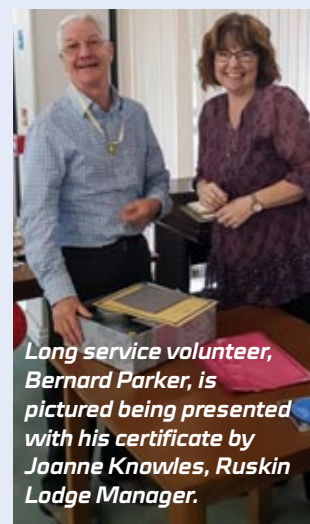
Rugby League LEGEND

Kath Miller, a Trust Fund's beneficiary from St Helens, found herself an unlikely You Tube star at 89 years of age after a bad fall. Kath wondered how she was going to cope at home after falling and fracturing her pelvis.

Following a 48-hour stay in hospital, Kath was transferred to Brookfields in St Helens for rehabilitation where she stayed for a month. Her physiotherapy team were so impressed at how she had recovered that they asked her to make a video explaining about her fall and how the

help she got from all the staff concerned has helped her get back on her feet and back to her art group. At first she wasn't too sure about making the video, but when the care staff explained that it would help other people who have had falls and were struggling with their recovery, she agreed and the video can be viewed on You Tube. Kath advises that if you ever find yourself in the same situation, listen to the staff and work with them, they are there to help you. After celebrating her 90th birthday in December, we think you will agree that Kath's willingness to help others is an inspiration to us all.

Kath is now back at the art group in Ruskin Drive, St Helens, where she has been going for over 20 years. Kath mainly likes to paint flowers as can be seen by the beautiful pictures shown above and right.

meet every Tuesday 9.30am to 12 noon. They use mainly water colour and acrylics. They would welcome any new members. For the last two years the group has been run by Brian Gormley. Children in Need 1988

John Davies has contacted us regarding a Pilkington Glass float from 1988, built as a galleon for Children in Need.

He remembers four of the payroll staff in Watson Street Works, Janet Makin, Jill Huyton, Margaret Gartside and Doreen Barrow asking Transport Department if they could 'borrow' one of their lorries and a driver (John), to raise money for Children in Need. They asked if the Wagon Shop Dept could construct a galleon on the back of the lorry. They then contacted other Pilkington sites and asked them to join them in raising money for the charity. They raised money by raffles, race nights and donations from suppliers, etc. During the Children in Need week they took the float to every Pilkington site in St Helens, shaking their buckets! On the Friday of Children in Need they sited the galleon in Church Square, St Helens and collected donations from the general public. On the Friday night the galleon was taken to Manchester Airport and the huge cheque for £15,000 was presented, live on TV.

Thirty-one years ago £15,000 was a magnificent sum to have collected and congratulations should go to all the staff who took part.

What did you do when you retired?

Trevor Adams and his wife Stephanie had a 17 year old autistic daughter and they soon found that whilst there appeared to be a lot of help for autistic children, adult social groups were few and far between. When Trevor retired they decided they would revitalise a small autism group that existed in St Helens to help their daughter and other autistic adults.

They found new premises and set about forming the Autism and Asperger Society. They provide a social drop in group for Autistic and Asperger adults, aged 18+, living in St Helens and the surrounding areas. They encourage autistic adults in socialisation, making like-minded friends and in gaining confidence by taking part in group activities, such as arts and crafts, games and computing. They have group days out, including meals and theatre trips. Trevor finds himself these days being the 'fix it' man for any odd jobs on the building and Stephanie is the Treasurer. They are always looking for volunteers, both young and old, so if you feel you could help please contact the group on 01744 362260, or visit them at 34 Hall Street, St Helens. Australia / New Zealand visit November 2019

Recently flying to Melbourne to meet with Pilkington retirees supported by the Trust Fund, I also met with the National Volunteer Co-ordinator, Arthur Johnson, to discuss the future of the Scheme in Australasia. This involved looking at the demographics and logistics in order to maintain the appropriate level of support going forward.

The long 24-hour journey on various flights to Melbourne began my visit to cities which correspond with the sites that Pilkington had in Australasia. At each location I speak briefly about NSG/Pilkington and its worldwide plans and performance. I then speak at length about our own plans as a Trust Fund and how we have performed since I last visited. This is always received with great interest.

Throughout my visit, the states of New South Wales, Victoria, Queensland and South Australia were in the grip of bushfires and many cities we visited had the acrid smell of smoke as it hung around buildings at high levels. This was in sharp contrast to the floods that were being reported at the same time in the UK. This confirmed to me that climate change is very much an agenda that we all need to take seriously.

One bright note to report from the visit is the resurrection of the Geelong plant just outside Melbourne. The plant has reopened recently as a glass supplier. An entrepreneur from Sydney has invested in the venture which is called Sologlass. It is employing 90 ex Pilkington employees and is now producing Architectural glass as opposed to the previous automotive glass. It was reported that the company is well

placed to expand in the future if orders continue as they are currently.

On the downside CSR the company that bought Pilkington Australia has just announced the sale of the business (rebranded Viridian) to a private equity company. The future of the whole business is unclear at present.

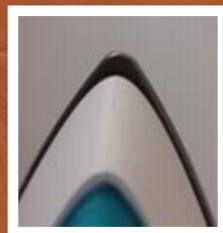
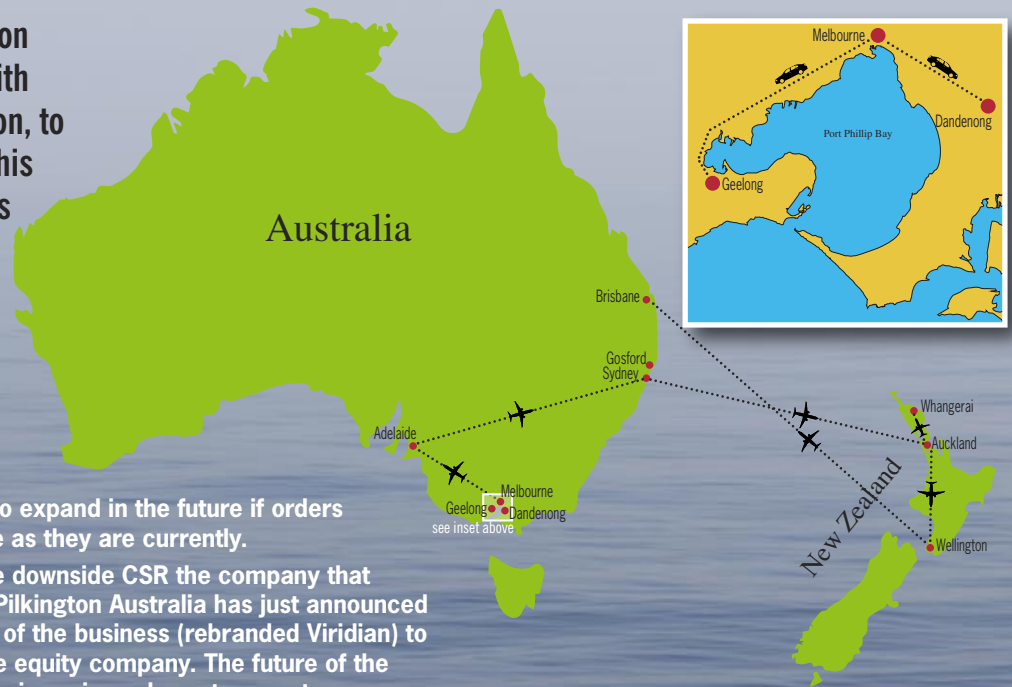
My busy visit involved meeting some 450 retirees across Geelong, Dandenong, Adelaide, Sydney, Whangerai, Wellington and Brisbane. I am sure some of those locations will evoke memories for many people who will have visited them in their working life. I met with many people who had made the opposite journey to attend training in the UK, many had fond memories of the Fleece Hotel in St Helens.

Whangerai near Auckland was the site of a drawn sheet plant which closed many years ago. On the day of our gathering one of our volunteers ran an archive film that was made in the 1970s, it showed how sheet glass was made at the works. Some of our attending retirees were the stars of the show. The footage

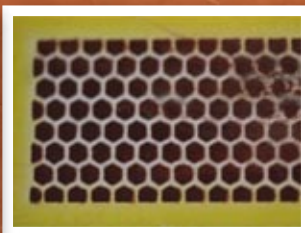
gave a great insight into the extreme hard and hot work that was involved in producing sheet glass, thank goodness for the float process. Interestingly enough, an aerial picture of the plant is now permanently on display in the local Town Hall as an acknowledgement of the huge contribution Pilkington made to the town.

The one consistent thing that I bring back from my overseas trips is that there is still a huge affinity felt for the company in these distant locations. One thing which is shared by all I speak to is that Pilkington was the best company they ever worked for.

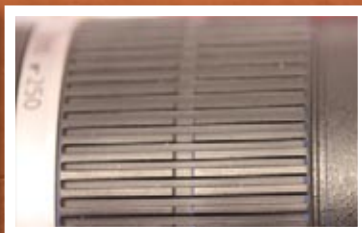

In the *PRISM* summer 2019 edition we printed an article from Ray Drury who had the last piece of amber glass from Chance Brothers. We thought our readers might like to see a larger piece of South African cullet!

Frank Thomas and his wife Joan emigrated to South Africa in September 1955 whilst employed by Pilkington. Frank worked in the Johannesburg Sales Office and travelled widely in his job, visiting merchants and architects in Durban, Port Elizabeth and Cape Town, to name but a few.

When a 'cold repair' was undertaken to a tank in the works at Springs, which is in the Gauteng Province, 50 kilometers east of Johannesburg, Frank was offered this beautiful piece

of cullet which had come out of the bottom of the tank.

Frank and Joan had two children whilst living in South Africa, Phillip and Diane. They all (including the cullet!) eventually returned home in December 1966 and Frank continued working for Pilkington in Nottingham until he retired in December 1986.

Frank and his family still live in Nottingham and the cullet has pride of place in his living room. Glass is still manufactured in Springs, though now it is owned by PFG Building Glass.
